Graduation: IIDT Edition

NVOT's IIDT program graduates their first ever class of students

Graduation marks an ending for every senior, but for the Class of 2024, it marks the beginning of the legacy of a unique new program.

The Institute of Interactive Design Technology, commonly referred to as IIDT, began with the Class of 2024. With students coming from towns all across Bergen County, the program served to develop students' skills in interface design (UX/UI design) while

simultaneously embracing a diverse community of aspiring athletes, writers, designers, and artists.

The current members of the Class of 2024 were the first ever freshmen to enter in the program (and the building) in the fall of 2020. Rather than attending the Bergen County Technical School, students take core academic courses at Northern Valley while also participating in the new IIDT curriculum. Most students had to commit to long commutes, coming from towns such as

Maywood, Bergenfield, and Rutherford, as they took on the program's new beginnings.

Assistant principal Luisella Marolda said, "Naturally, being from various towns throughout Bergen County, they were able to bring new perspectives and experiences with them."

Fourteen students within the IIDT program will graduate this year. These dedicated students quickly became meaningful members of the NVOT Community. Marolda said, "This specific cohort has

made it a mission to be proud of their unique program as well as becoming immersed in our community in a way that is nothing other than a Golden Knight."

They also left their marks on NVOT activities. For example, Cody Budinich won the New Jersey School Board Unsung Hero Award, Sam Cruz was nominated for best makeup design for The High School Theater Metro Awards, and Abigail Dennis broke school (and county) track and field records.

With success, comes challenges, but those challenges were overcome. Senior and IIDT student Haley Rodriguez said, "For us, when a lesson plan wasn't successful we worked together to make a better learning experience for ourselves, helping and teaching each other."

IIDT students have also had the opportunity to get involved in NVOT's athletics. Rodriguez said, "My favorite memory from the past four years was cheering and celebrating in the rain on the Rutgers field after winning the state championship for varsity cheerleading."
